Exercise 1

Discuss different kinds of crime with the students. Read examples to make sure the students understand.

Examples:

- The gangsters were arrested as soon as the local businessmen found the courage to report the **extortion**. It turned out that the gang had been **extorting** money from more than 20 restaurants for almost 5 years.
- 'Catch me if you can' with Leonardo di Caprio and Tom Hanks is based on a true story of teenager Frank Abagnale charged with **forgery** of pay checks.
- The painter was so skillful that most experts were unable to distinguish the original painting from the **forgery**.
- In 2008 Jerome Kerviel, an employee of the French Bank Societe Generale, was arrested for the **fraud** of €5 bn, the biggest fraud in the history of French banking.
- Everyone was very surprised when they found out the mayor of the town had **embezzled** over £1.5 million of public funds.
- The driver offered the policeman a €100 **bribe** to drop the charge of speeding.

Exercise 3

Read the text and answer the questions.

That day began as usual. I got up and went through my usual morning routine. At seven I was ready to take the kids to school. We went downstairs to the garage and found the car was missing. At first, I simply thought I had left the car outside the previous evening. I ran around the block twice with a growing conviction that the car had been stolen. The kids must have had great fun seeing me running around with their school bags.

I returned to the garage, found some pieces of glass (probably the side window had been broken), and decided to call the police. The lady took my report over the phone: she noted all the details – my name, surname, the address, the telephone number, the car's colour, brand, year, etc. Finally she thanked me and told me to report the theft personally at the nearest police station. I called a taxi to take kids to school. My younger daughter began to cry when she realized what had happened. She loved that car. Immediately after the taxi driver had pulled over to let the kids out for school, I told him to go to the nearest police station.

I was really glad to learn that the police station had the ISO quality management system. I thought that they would surely be able to find the car quickly. I reported the crime at the reception desk and was asked to take a seat and wait for an officer that would conduct the investigation.

The policemen took half an hour to get to me, I thought he was going to tell me that they had already found the car. Unfortunately he took me to a room to listen to my story, ask me questions and write everything down in hand! It took us about an hour and a half. When I thought we were close to the end he informed me that we would then have to go to see the scene of crime. I timidly pointed out that there was not much to see. But the policeman insisted as it was part of the ISO procedure they had introduced two years before.

We arrived at my home within the next 30 minutes and went into the empty garage. The policeman described it thoroughly (a page long dissertation on four walls, a ceiling and floor), measured everything (the distance from the left wall to the right wall, from the floor to the ceiling, from the back wall to the right wall, from the front wall to the back wall, and so on and so forth), carefully studied the pieces of glass and even took some samples and finally finished.
